Last year RACET announced plans to build a library and computer centre at the Community Secondary School of Ntrigom in Cross River State with funds donated in memory of RACET supporter Sir Brandon Gough by his generous family and friends.

RACET is delighted to announce that construction of the building is finished, and we are now in the process of furnishing the Centre with computers and learning resources which will greatly improve access to information. A special feature of the new computers is that they will arrive pre-loaded with courses from Khan Academy, "a non-profit organisation with the mission of providing a free, world-class education for anyone, anywhere". These exciting courses are widely used in the United States and Europe and will provide a quantum leap in the quality of education available to our students, their teachers, and the wider community.

Of course, reliable access to electricity still poses a challenge throughout Nigeria, and although the Centre will be connected to the local electricity grid, RACET is seeking donations for the installation of solar panels to help make the Centre as selfsufficient as possible in terms of energy supply and lower running costs.

We expect to have the Centre fully functional by October and the start of the new school year. RACET would like to thank its Trustees Tunji Adeleye in Sevenoaks and Fr. Kenneth Egere in Nigeria for their tireless efforts in raising additional funds and successfully monitoring the building project over the past year.
